#### Miracles show God but are not proof of God

Why do the four evangelists focus on miracles? When the gospels were composed, the divinity of Jesus was taken for granted and all Christian Scriptures were directed to only believers. They were not intended to convert, but to teach and strengthen believers. In the biblical world of two thousand years ago, working miracles were not necessarily a sign of divinity. Our evangelists include miracles in narratives to demonstrate <a href="https://what.kind.org/">what kind</a> of a God Jesus is. Many of us grew up with catechisms, but the people who produced the Christian Scriptures had no catechisms. They wanted readers to reflect upon the experiences of the risen Jesus and asked, "How did Jesus change our lives?" to more clearly see the divinity of Jesus.

That's why it shouldn't surprise us that <u>Mark</u> (7:31-37) invites us to reflect upon one fact: how did Jesus, as God, both open our ears and give us the ability to speak. The risen Jesus had pronounced "Ephphatha!" Open up! And because people now heard new things, they were also able to speak things that almost no one around them spoke. The letter of Saint James gives us an example of these new insights (<u>James</u> 2:1-5). Each Christian felt God's love in a special way through the presence of Jesus among them. That is why they began to hear the cries of the poor they had never heard before. Once they discovered that they were all equal in Jesus, they knew they never again could discriminate against others. James urges his community: "*My brothers and sisters, show no partiality as you adhere to the faith in our glorious Lord Jesus Christ*". Once our ears are open to new voices, we begin to act in new ways.

The early church had experienced the things Isaiah had announced (<u>Isaiah</u> 35:4-7a): "Then will the eyes of the blind be opened, the ears of the deaf be cleared; then will the lame leap like a stag, then the tongue of the mute will sing." They were able to live as they had never lived before. Jesus did not come just to get us into heaven. He also came to help us enjoy a life we couldn't imagine without him, a life to carry us into eternity with him. The miracles in the gospels are used by second and third generation Christians. By telling these miracles, early Christians gave voice to the newness they had achieved in their Christ-filled lives and wrote down the miracles to explain what the risen Jesus had changed in their lives.

It would be interesting to compose new miracles for today, which mirror **our** experiences with Jesus. Let us take some moments to reflect on those new miracles in our 21st century lives that show our experience with Jesus changing our lives. cf. http://www.dignityusa.org/node/821 **Fr.
