God invites all of us to a great feast and is unhappy when folks don't accept the invitation

The vision of **Isaiah** (Is 25,6-10a) is the vision of a God who wants good things for all people, no one is excluded. The world in which Isaiah lives is a world of poverty and injustice – not unlike ours. And in this world, Isaiah paints a vision of a God who provides for everyone generously. Isaiah's world is a world of nationalism and of ethnic and racial division. And in this world, Isaiah paints a vision of a God who destroys the web that covers all people, who destroys the veil that divides all people. The world in which Isaiah lives is a world in which people are focused on money and the problems of the economy. And in this world, Isaiah talks about discovering a God who saves us.

Isaiah talks about a God with a liberating set of values. In a world, which continues to see so many tears and so much injustice, Isaiah paints the vision of a God who wants to wipe away those tears and bring us together in a new way. This vision of Isaiah has been written down some hundred years before Jesus began his teaching. And this vision of Isaiah is repeated in Jesus' story of the wedding feast (Mt 22,1-14).

What God wants is a great wedding feast – a feast that is open to all. God is unhappy when folks don't accept the invitation. "*The servants went out into the streets and gathered all they found, bad and good alike, and the hall was filled with guests*" (Mt 22,10). The vision is expressed in what we call today the *"option for the poor.*" The vision is made concrete whenever we work to include those on the outside, those without power, minorities, women, immigrants, the elderly, the sick, those who don't fit our expectations and priorities.

In our fast and busy world, this story of Jesus reminds us of what can prevent us from sharing in the vision Jesus has for us. What can prevent us from sharing in his vision? We get too busy with other things. We miss the invitation. Instead of taking advantage of the feast, we end up going our own way to "*buy a farm*" or "*manage a business*" (Mt 22,5). We may become preoccupied with money or possessions or security or comfort. Then we may get separated from the vision of Jesus; we may miss out on the great wedding feast. In modern words: we can be distracted by the various ideologies of our culture - ideologies like consumerism, discrimination, militarism, sexism, racism, fear, isolation, ferocious individualism, nationalism, and so on. We can be distracted by wealth or financial security or entertainment or prestige. This may be what Jesus warns us of.

The passage from **Philippians** (Phil 4,12-14.19-20) reminds us that the vision of Jesus is a vision of freedom: to have a lot or a little, to come to the banquet and to share the banquet, to share "in the glorious riches of Jesus Christ." It is the very opposite of the spirit that leaves a large percentage of mankind, men, women and children in poverty and hunger. It is the opposite of the spirit of war and terrorism. It is the very opposite of the spirit that puts us in a world of radical economic inequality and injustice. It is the very opposite of so many of the "ungodly" or "unholy" spirits around us.

So, what do we find in the three texts? In the three texts, we find an unconditional invitation to come together, to rejoice in life, to take time to be with others and to be thankful for our lives. In none of the texts we need to fulfill rules or commandments or directives to be invited. We just need to accept the invitation that comes from God, from Jesus – and I may say: from our fellow human beings. At the end of this short homily, just two questions: How does this image of a banquet help us envision what God might want for our world? How does the image of the wedding feast contrast with our perception of what we witness in our world?
