Transform the way we see life and the way we commit ourselves... Glory and Praise - Page no. 812

The scripture readings presented to us today are: The Sacrifice of Isaac (Gen 22); the famous passage from Romans "With God on our side who could be against us?" (Rom 8) and St Mark's account of the Transfiguration (Mark 9).

We need to hear the Genesis reading against the background in which it was originally composed; otherwise some of us might think that Yahweh is history's most sadistic God. Our passage was written in the 8th century before Christ. Israelites frequently copied the religious practices of their pagan neighbors: some even sacrificed children like their neighbors did.

There was a thinking that went like: if you generously offer your first-born male child to the local fertility god, that god would generously see to it that you had many more (preferably male) children, when this life ended, you would live on forever in the memory of your descendants. If you refused to offer that first-born male, you had to reckon with the wrath and punishment of the fertility god.

Of course, faithful followers of Yahweh refused to kill their children and they often had to endure the criticism of their pagan neighbors that they were not as dedicated to their Jewish God as non-Jews were to their pagan gods. The author of this passage invents a story to convince the Israelites that child sacrifice is a no-go in the Jewish religion. In this invented story, Abraham, the ancestor of all Jews, is depicted as willing to sacrifice his first-born, Isaac, if that is what Yahweh demands of him. This biblical narrative wreaks havoc with our emotions – and that is the intention of the author: Abraham not only has three days to think it over, but also engages in a heart wrenching conversation with Isaac as they are climbing up to the sacrificial site. Fortunately, we all know the "happy ending": Yahweh or his messenger intervenes just in time to stop the sacrifice; Abraham substitutes a ram for the boy. "All's well that ends well."

The author's message is clear: faithful Jews were expected to go against the practices of their pagan neighbors who wanted to control their gods by sacrificing children, who believed that if they said a certain prayer so many times, if they held their hands in a specific way, or if they performed actions which attracted the attention of the gods then the gods would be forced to grant whatever they prayed for. The name Israel comes from "to wrestle with God" – Jacob wrestled with God. True to their name, Israelites wrestled with their God, they did not try to control God; they received life by preserving life, not by taking it in a sacrifice.

The earliest followers of Jesus also stood out among their contemporaries on the issue of life: they didn't <u>take</u> life - they <u>gave</u> life for the others in their community, for the well-being of their brothers and sisters, for the well-being of the society in which they lived.

Did this "giving their lives" diminish the quality of their lives? In his letter to the Christian community in Rome, Paul assures them that their mentor, their guide, their teacher Jesus actually experienced <u>a completely new life</u> when he gave his life for us.

No wonder that Mark in his Gospel includes a transfiguration story: he is always interested in pointing out the uniqueness of Jesus, and also the uniqueness of his followers. The faith of the historical Jesus transfigured him in the sight of his friends, of those who were with him on the mountain, it transfigured him – but Jesus' faith also transfigured them. Mark, by writing the story of the transfiguration, is graphically displaying one of his deepest convictions: by imitating Jesus, we look at life from a completely unique perspective, from the perspective of Jesus, from the perspective of the faith of Jesus. If we are able to imitate Jesus in this life-giving perspective, then we shall be able to actually transfigure life itself, to transform the way we see life and the way we commit ourselves in our lives.
