See the risen Jesus in the men and women and children around us!

One of the most significant lines in today's three readings comes at the end of our gospel passage: Jesus reminds the disciples: "You are witnesses of these things" (Luke 24:48). This verse assures us that the true followers of Jesus, his friends, cannot be identified by the catechism answers they can rattle off or by the number of indulgences they have acquired or by the religious symbols they wear. The disciples, the friends of Jesus are simply people to be listened to, they are witnesses to the dying and rising of Jesus; witnesses not so much because they actually were in Jerusalem during Passover week in the year 30, but because they have had the same experience of "dying and rising" in their own lives. Since these life-changing things happened to the disciples, these things must also have happened to Jesus: these experiences they have are the same one Jesus must have had: "dying and rising".

The apostle Peter can certainly witness to this unique experience. Just a few weeks before, he emphatically told one of the maids of the high priest: "Woman, I do not know him!" when she asked him about his relationship with some newly arrested Galilean carpenter. Now Peter not only cures a crippled beggar in Jesus' name, he openly scolds and blames those who took part in putting Jesus to death. Yet Peter does not do so just to give them a guilt trip, he wants them "to convert, that your sins may be wiped away" – as the text says (Acts 3:19). Peter hopes they will also be witnesses of Jesus' dying and rising in their own lives.

Of course, the main way our biblical authors believe we die and rise with Jesus is by undergoing a "metanoia:" a repentance. That is how Jesus began his public ministry; proclaiming the presence of God in the lives of those who undergo a total change in their value systems. The author of the first letter of St John sees this repentance as revolving around keeping God's commandments as Jesus taught them (1 Joh 2); these commandments focus on the needs of others around us.

If friends of Jesus experience this metanoia, this repentance, this change of their value system, this new perspective, then they experience the risen Jesus in their daily lives, then they must be witnesses of that experience. And it is not something they are to keep to themselves. Others must also be invited to share in this new life.

It is important in today's gospel passage that the two Emmaus disciples mention that the risen Jesus "was made known to them in the breaking of the bread" (Luke 24:35). Jesus as Luke presents him takes great pains on Easter Sunday night to prove he's "not a ghost." But how do we know he is real *today*? The best and most beautiful way is in the breaking of the bread. Though most of our early Eucharistic catechesis puts the stress on Jesus' presence in the bread, we know from the letters of St Paul that second-generation Christians stressed his presence in one another: it was not so difficult to profess faith in the presence of Jesus in the bread and wine; but it was certainly "controversial" to acknowledge that same presence of Jesus in those standing or sitting around them. If these first Christians couldn't experience the risen Jesus in them, then Jesus most probably **was** just a *ghost*.

We here in All Saints should wish to form our Sunday Eucharistic community into the Body of Christ – see the risen Jesus in the men and women and children around us. The followings are valid for you here in the assembly just as for us priests: if we worry only about saying the right words and performing the right gestures then we shall never have a true breaking of the bread, then we shall never help anyone become a true *witness*. And even ourselves will not become true *witnesses* of the life God has given us in the risen Jesus.
